The department continues to improve and under Ron's leadership I suspect there will be many more good things to come. So, please give him your support when he takes over on January 1, 2011.

I wish to thank each and every one of you for your support over the years. It truly has been my pleasure to work & serve so many terrific people. I have to admit I did a darn fine job of getting some of the best people in the country. I must give a special thanks to my administrative assistant Donelle Moormeier. She has been terrific to work with over the years. From the Desk of the Graduate Director

One great opportunity I have had as President of the National Communication Association is to speak at different conferences and visit with a wide variety of scholars. I hear over and over how impressed our national colleagues are with UNL and the excellence of our graduate students. I never disagree with anyone who says this about us! We are very proud of our current graduate students and our alumni who continue to represent us so well.

Our new graduate students are off and running this fall. We continue to recruit and enroll top quality scholars with a national profile. In my analysis we admitted only about 12% of doctoral applicants and 5% of M.A. applicants, admitting top students with a national profile. Our new students hail from University of Alabama, San Diego State, Central Michigan, George Mason, University of Montana, and University of Central Florida. These students had conference papers, research experience, and came highly recommended from top scholars in the discipline. They are doing very well this fall, and from what I can see on

Facebook, they have happily discovered Nebraska Football and are enjoying Lincoln.

Our returning students are also distinguishing themselves. We have named our first three Phyllis Japp Scholars for 2010-2011: Scott Church, Haley Kranstuber, and Sarah Steimel (read more about the Phyllis Japp Scholars on page 5). Scott Church and Tiffany Wang were among the 31 students selected to attend the NCA Doctoral Honors Seminar this past summer (it was a highly competitive field of 90+ applicants). In recent months students have had publications accepted, presented papers at conferences (several Top Papers), and won awards. You'll see news about some of these

accomplishments in this newsletter.

We do appreciate those alumni who support our current students, giving financial support, helping with data collections, giving advice on the job market, and reading dissertation chapters.

Spotlight on Graduate Alumnus Dr. Thomas Hollihan



1) During which years were you a student at UNL? Which degree(s) did you earn at UNL? When did you graduate?

I studied at UNL from 1975 until 1978 and graduated with my Ph.D. in December, 1978.

2) Why did you choose a degree in Communication Studies?

The department was called Speech Communication when I studied at UNL. I had been interested in speech since I was in junior high school. I participated on the debate team and discovered that giving speeches was actually something I was pretty good at, at least compared to my athletic abilities. I stuck with debate all through high school and college and that drew me into the discipline.

3) What brought you to study Communication at UNL?

The assistantship offer! Both my spouse Patti Riley and I were seeking doctorate, and we were actually going to have to live on our graduate stipends. Even though it was pretty meager, the UNL offer was more generous than the offer from

Northwestern and the rent in Lincoln was much cheaper than the rent in Evanston. I also knew the work of several members of the faculty including the debate coach at the time, Jackson Harrell, and I thought I would enjoy working with him. Of course, Harrell left UNL before I even arrived. His move worked out for me though as my undergraduate debate coach and M.A. thesis advisor Jim Klumpp was hired to replace him. Let there be no doubt that Klumpp chose Nebraska so he could continue to work with me!

4) What have you been doing since leaving UNL?

I spent two years (1978-1980) as an assistant professor at Illinois State. I moved to USC as an assistant professor and as the director of forensics in 1980. I have been here ever since. I got out of forensics in 1990, but then served as department chair for six years and as an associate dean for ten years.

5) What is a favorite memory of your time in Communication Studies at UNL?

I recall most the camaraderie between the students and faculty members. It was common for us to gather for social events on the weekend and to dine together. I met colleagues who would become lifelong friends. I remember the pre-game and post-game football parties, the margaritas at Tico's, prime rib at Misty's, and pizza at Valentino's. Don't everyone's best memories revolve around food and drink?

6) In what ways can alumni support our department and students?

One, of course, is by offering financial contributions to ensure that today's

students enjoy the best educational experience possible, including access to world class professors, cutting edge communication technologies, research funds, and opportunities for travel to conferences. All states are experiencing financial challenges today and as a result university budgets are being cut. Every contribution, no matter how small, helps. UNL has always suffered under tight budgets and the available funds have never matched the ambitions of the faculty and students. Surely these ambitions will grow still further as the university begins to compare itself to its peer institutions in the Big 10 conference. All alumni should want UNL to compete as successfully in academics as it will in athletics. Second, alumni can give back by promoting the department through their networking efforts. Alumni can offer to mentor a current student, help fellow graduates find employment, or recommend their own best students for admission to graduate study at UNL.

7) What advice do you have for current undergraduate/graduate students in our department?

Work hard and play hard. Understand that your college years are brief and you should therefore take advantage of as many opportunities as you can. Attend as many public lectures and events as possible. Ask lots of questions. Seek out and meet people from different disciplines, cultures, and professional backgrounds. Try to be open-minded, curious, ambitious and disciplined. Focus on your personal and professional goals but also on your ability to help shape the society in which you and someday your children and grandchildren will live.

1) During which years were you a student at UNL? Which degree(s) did you earn at UNL? When did you graduate?

I was a student at UNL from 1998 to December 2002 and earned degrees in Broadcasting and Political Science, with a minor in Communication Studies.

2) Why did you choose a minor in Communication Studies?

I knew that to share my views with society and make an impact, I would have to communicate effectively. Even more than my Communication classes, working with the Forensics team taught me how to organize my ideas, speak with passion, and grow from constructive criticism.

3) What brought you to study Communication at UNL?

I started on the Forensics team as a freshman and learned that to understand the art of communication on a deeper level I needed to take classes in my areas of interest, like political communication.

4) What have you been doing since leaving UNL?

I have been serving in the Nebraska Legislature for four years representing Legislative District 26. Before that, I was a television journalist for two and a half years directly out of college.

5) What has communication brought to your career?

Communication plays a critical role in politics, whether I am campaigning or sharing my ideas with my colleagues. My time practicing public speaking as an undergrad prepared me to deliver speeches and participate in debates over pending legislation.

6) What is a favorite memory of your time in Communication Studies at UNL?

The team also had a strong showing at the National Forensics Association tournament where the debate team finished 11th. At the state level the team achieved the rare

feat of winning the state speech title, the state debate title, and the overall title. This is the 5th consecutive year the team has won the state speech title and the first time in more than a decade the team has won the state debate title.

This year promises to continue the long tradition of Husker forensics success. The team welcomes two new assistant coaches David Tuck and Darrel Farmer. The season kicks off September 25th-26th at Sterling College.


